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

Unveiling My Path from Pre-Med to Epidemiology: A Journey of Passion and Purpose in Public Health

From the beginning, I knew my passion for helping people and my love for science and math would lead me to pursue a major in natural science with a pre-med track. However, an unexpected change in my course selections during my sophomore year introduced me to the field of public health. This eye-opening experience revealed the power of

epidemiology in understanding population health, guiding me to specialize in investigating substance abuse and racial stressors' impact on health behaviors and outcomes. Networking and building relationships with classmates, professors, and mentors were shaping crucial in my professional journey, opening opportunities doors to working with the Office of Minority Health at the National Institute of Health for ten years.

Beyond my major, my minors in chemistry and sociology provided unique insights into my work as epidemiologist. Understanding the population developing and tailored interventions became my forte, contributing to the success of various projects and initiatives. Despite challenges with imposter syndrome, I embraced support system at the College of Charleston's TRIO program, realizing that it wasn't about

inadequacy but acknowledging systemic inequities and devising a plan to thrive in my studies.

Completing internships and fellowships exposed me to realworld applications, where I conducted research, published scientific work, and gained valuable experience and social communication change. Witnessing experienced professionals navigating challenges and striving for health equity inspired me to focus on bridging the gap between assessment and policy development. As I earned my terminal degree, I remained determined to create datadriven, tailored, and sustainable interventions that promote health equity and make public health the impactful field it should be.

From TRIO Upward Bound to Capitol Hill: How Washington, D.C. Ignited My Career

In Washington, D.C., building meaningful relationships with people, especially those with similar values, ideas, lived experiences, or perspectives, has benefitted me.

As an alumnus of the **Southern University A&M College** TRIO

Upward Bound program, I was ready to step onto the Penn State University campus and fully leverage all available resources and opportunities. I grew up in New Orleans and spent most of my pre-college life in Louisiana, so attending college in Pennsylvania was a pivotal moment that set me on an accelerated trajectory.

Participating TRIO and graduating created fresh pathways for me in D.C. I relocated from to D.C. Pennsylvania with political science, communication arts and sciences, and civic community engagement degrees. These credentials enabled me to succeed during my time on Capitol Hill (in the U.S. House and the Senate) and my service in the executive office of D.C. Mayor Muriel Bowser.

I've written legislation, press releases, talking points, and

speeches for multiple Members of Congress, managed vital relationships and community partnerships for the mayor of the nation's capital, and even guided long-term public policy strategy and development as a senior-level government affairs professional.

In D.C., I have found invaluable connections through my involvement with networks here - including the **Congressional Black Caucus Foundation**, the Aspen Institute, Alpha Phi Alpha, Wilson Center's Foreign Policy Fellowship Program, and many more. My time in college has been an investment that has paid off in every phase of my career and has fortunately created a stable foundation for my current life in D.C.
